McMASTER UNIVERSITY RETIREES' ASSOCIATION

Minutes of the 14th Annual General Meeting held on May 26, 1999 at 3pm in the Eleanor McKay Room, Moulton Hall.

1. WELCOME

John McCutcheon, President, warmly welcomed the 67 members and guests.

2. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS AGM

5. AUDITOR'S REPORT

In the absence of the auditor, John McCutcheon presented the following report from Warren Mousley:

"I have examined the statement of receipts, disbursements and financial position of the McMaster University Retirees' Association for the year ending April 30, 1999. Receipts as shown in the accompanying statement is the amount reflected in the records of the Association but has not been verified by myself.

In my opinion the accompanying statement of receipts, disbursements and financial position present fairly the results of activities of the Association for the year ended April 30, 1999 and its assets as of that date."

- 6. PENSION TRUST COMMITTEE Gerry King
 This report will be published in the next edition of the MURAL.
 The increase in retirees' pensions effective July 1, 1999 will be 0.9%.
- 7. RETIREMENT PROVISIONS REVIEW COMMITTEE Jack Evans
 J. Evans briefly reported on the activities and issues addressed by this ad hoc committee, which was established in August 1998.

He noted that the committee was established to review the current defined-benefit structure of the McMaster pension plan and other forms of delivering pensions (e.g. money purchase); review the benefits provided under the McMaster Retirement Programme in light of actions taken by governments(e.g. deferral of indexation of maximum pensions to 2005); and consider the options available to meet the unfunded liabilities associated with the provision of medical and dental benefits to retirees; and make recommendations on the above.

After a series of fortnightly meetings and the review of a mass of documentation, the committee concluded that there was little interest in changing the McMaster pension scheme from a defined benefit scheme to a defined-contribution money-purchase) scheme. In February 1999, attention then turned to the conditions that would be required by each group constituting the committee to reach agreement for the removal of the excess pension surplus from the plan.

The University's main interest in such action results from its desire to use the funds to establish an endowment fund of some considerable financial magnitude in order to attract new, young faculty to the University, and to establish a Trust Fund to cover the currently unfunded costs of medical and dental

benefits to retirees.

Each of the employees associations has, in turn, identified its

priorities for use of the excess pension surplus.

MURA, in identifying its priorities, has focused on measures that would be tax-neutral to retirees. Thus the focus has been on benefit improvement, rather than increased pensions beyond government mandated amounts, that can be paid annually from the Pension Plan.

Negotiating positions have been passed between the parties (i.e. University and employee groups and retirees) but there is no agreement on a plan that is acceptable to all parties. At this time the greatest impediment to an agreement is the University's insistence that any agreement must include a formula for the future automatic withdrawal of excess surplus. For MURA, an additional stumbling block is the University's unwillingness to restore funding for semi-private hospital coverage in Option 4 at the same level currently received by faculty/librarian retirees.

Should an agreement ever be reached, such agreement would have to be endorsed by the Board of Governors; be approved by a substantial majority of plan members (voting by association identification); and then be approved by the Ontario Financial Services Commission and the Department of National Revenue. Thus, implementation of any agreement will take at least one

year, if not longer, to implement!

McMASTER UNIVERSITY RETIREES' ASSOCIATION BENEFITS REVIEW, 1998-1999

The communications regarding benefits changes and options for retirees finally went out to the various groups in the fall of 1998. Information sessions were held for the different groups October to December. A subgroup of the Council worked with Human Resources throughout the summer and fall on the drafts of the plans and on the accompanying explanatory memos. Members of Council were at the various information sessions.

Council took up the case of the Parking Group which had been included incorrectly with the unionized sections of employees and were therefore denied the benefits options offered to other retirees. We contacted the University Administration about this, and the situation is to be clarified and corrected.

We have expressed our concern to the University Administration over the increasingly widening differences in benefits for the various retiree groups. This stems from the negotiations between the University and the various employee groups.

Retiree members of the Ivor Wynne Centre were recently informed that a fee was to be levied. Since free membership is one of the benefits offered to retirees, these members and Council were concerned—both at the imposition of the fee but more importantly at the precedent of withdrawing benefits which were in place at the time of retirement. Discussions on the matter are at present underway.

Finally, there are still some problems with hospitals regarding semi-private coverage. We have been in touch with local hospitals on this issue. Retirees and their spouses are urged to carry their Sun Life card with the McMaster policy number and the retiree's ID number, and to be aware of the provisions of the plan they have chosen in the recent options package.
